Our take on the concept: 15 outdoor education days a year.

Didactical thoughts

We work with outdoor learning days like this:

Before	Outdoor learning day	After
We explore a topic in class. Brainstorming, reading, teachers presentations and so on	We gather information in the real world, we try something that we have learned about or someone is visiting us to teach us something.	We write a rapport or an essay, make models, a podcast or evaluate the topic in other ways. Or we simply continue the topic.

Examples





The youngest pupils have worked with instructive texts such as recipes and manuals in Danish class, and now they are trying to follow some of the instructions in real life in our beautiful surroundings.





4th grade pupils have been exploring the neighbourhood formed by the ice age. They have biked 25 km around Saltum to get a feeling of the hill island Saltum is placed on, and they have seen the very flat area south of Saltum, where there once was an ocean - it is now farmland and a lot of windmills are placed there too.





In science 5th grade have worked with freshwater as a topic and this day they biked to a lake in a small village nearby and explored the life in and around the lake.




In religion 6th grade have collaborated with the church about making a temporary altarpiece to the church, because the existing one is being restored. They have spend time choosing the themes and motives during the topic, and this day they are doing the painting in the church's premises.
















In geography 8th grade has worked on a topic about high moors and we have biked to Store Vildmose to explore the very special ecosystem. We got a guided tour from a very enthusiastic guide. These photos are from the rest afterwards.









In history the 9th graders have had the topic "2. World War". This day they visited the historical museum in Aalborg to learn more about the German occupation of Denmark. They also did a city walk in Aalborg to hear the interesting stories about the Churchill Group which was a resistance group.

Other examples
